# "JUST BE A KID"

Holidays are usually a time of pure joy for children — full of presents and parties, and games and treats.

But on Christmas Day 2014, two-year-old Morgan endured 28 seizures in a 24-hour period.

The seizures first began when Morgan was two months old. She was rushed to the Stollery Children's Hospital, where Morgan was diagnosed with a form of epilepsy called cortical dysplasia.

Medication helped control her seizures for the first two years, but from November 2014 to January 2015 Morgan had almost 900 seizures. Averaging 15-20 seizures a day.

The Stollery neurology team ran Morgan through a bunch of testing, including a full neuro-psychology assessment, seizure mapping, a PET scan and detailed MRI of her brain. They were determined to solve the puzzle of Morgan's seizures and free her from this exhausting condition.

When Morgan was seven, Stollery neurologists recommended brain surgery to remove part of her frontal lobe — about the size of a small package of Post-it notes.

After the four-hour surgery, Morgan was seizure-free for the longest period of her life – 628 days (nearly 1 year and 9 months)!

Nine days post-surgery, she went back to school!

As her brain grows, there are obstacles to overcome, but Morgan and her parents know that her Stollery family will be with her every step of the way.

"Everyone goes to the Stollery. If you haven't been there yourself, you know somebody who's been



to the Stollery," says Morgan's dad.

Morgan recently had a brain scan, which revealed that her focal cortical dysplasia has healed and is no longer causing seizure activity. However, she is now presenting with generalized epilepsy. This form of epilepsy presents at the beginning of puberty and most children (70%) do not carry it forward into adulthood. Morgan's parents are confident that with the help of the Stollery, Morgan will again overcome this challenge.

How's Morgan doing now? "She loves to dance, to colour, and to do crafts – and just to be a kid."

In a loving nutshell, that's the goal of every doctor, nurse and member of staff at the Stollery. And it's the vision of our Foundation supporters and donors, too. We do everything we can to give all kids the best chance to live a long and healthy life. And to let them...

"just be a kid."

# YOU'RE HELPING THE STOLLERY TRANSPORT TEAM SAVE LIVES

The Stollery Children's Hospital in Edmonton is Western Canada's referral centre for children experiencing serious heart and lung failure. When these babies and children need help, they need help <u>urgently</u>.

With the generous support of our donors, the transport team at the Stollery now has a specialized, dedicated, "ready to go" stretcher — with everything needed to safely transport a pediatric patient by ambulance, plane or helicopter.

They can get children back to the Stollery faster — at a time when every single second counts.

ECMO (Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation) targets the heart and lungs and is the most advanced form of life support available to Stollery patients.

The ECMO team is a skilled group of Registered Nurses, respiratory therapists and physicians who work alongside the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) transport team. They have all received

extensive training in providing air and ground support to critically ill children.

With a highly-trained transport team, and this specialized ECMO transport stretcher, the Stollery gives "another chance" to children across Western Canada in severe distress, who may otherwise not make it.



Supporters like you understand that caring for the whole family helps us care for the child. Thank you for helping us care even more for families during their time at the Stollery.






